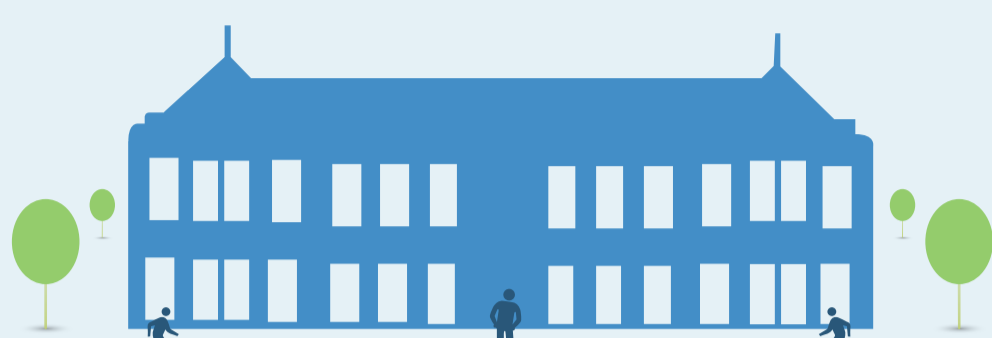




Both the institutions that have come together to create the University of South Wales have a rich and varied history, and can each trace their roots back more than 100 years.

The **Newport Technical Institute** opens in 1910 at Clarence Place, Newport town centre

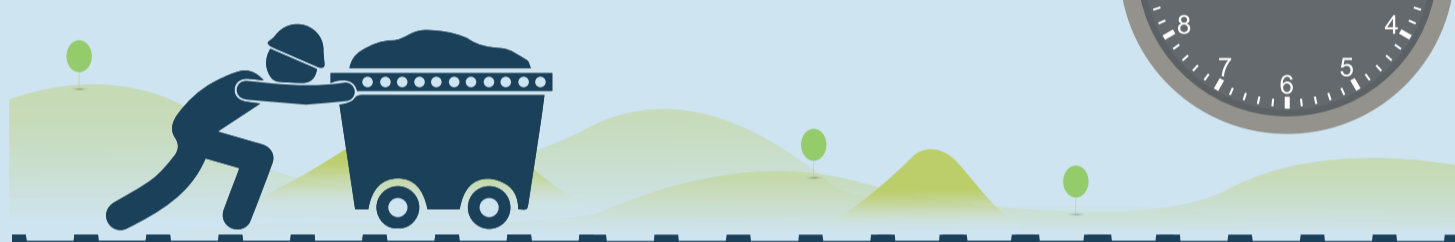


Local industrial leaders come together to form
The South Wales and Monmouthshire School of Mines,
which opens in 1913 with 17 students at Treforest

The Caerleon Training College opens in 1914, in Caerleon

The Treforest school is renamed the **School of Mines and Technology**

The **University of Glamorgan & the University of Wales College, Newport**

The Polytechnic of Wales at Treforest becomes the **University of Glamorgan** in 1992

In 1996, the Gwent College of Higher Education is admitted
into the University of Wales as the **University of Wales College,
Newport**



The **Royal Welsh College of Music** becomes a wholly owned
subsidiary of the University of Glamorgan



The University of Glamorgan opens its iconic **ATRium**
building in Cardiff city centre

The **Universities Heads of the Valleys Institute (UHOVI)** is
launched in 2009 as a partnership between the University of
Glamorgan and the University of Wales, Newport



The University of Wales, Newport opens its **iconic £35m City Campus**

The **University of South Wales** is formed by the merger of the University of
Glamorgan and the University of Wales, Newport in April 2013.



The **Chancellor of the University of South Wales**
